	Introductions were made by all attendees.			
	Apologies from Lee Anderson, Chris Baron, John Bennett, Paul Crawford,

2	Reflections of Previous Meeting – Martin Rigley			
	 Roy Lewis commented that at the previous meeting Helen Davis proposed the decision for funding to be used for community and voluntary groups to undertake face-to-face consultation however Helen is not listed as a board member and is an observer. Martin thanked Roy for this observation and proposed the decision, Cllr Relf seconded. 			
	All other minutes agreed. Actions			
	 The board agreed inviting the Council's Community Safety Manager to the 			
	next board meeting to understand the safety and security projects further.			
3	Chair & Vice-Chair role – Martin Rigley			
	Martin explained there would need to be an election of a Chair and Vice-Chair			
	as he stands as the interim currently.			
	He expressed an interest in being the Chair of the board and asked if there			
	were any other board members wanting to be considered.			
	Hollie asked the board if anyone else wanted to put themselves forward.			
	 Cllr Relf endorsed Martin in the role of chair as he has been successful in steering the Discover Ashfield board. 			
	Martin asked if there was an interest in being Vice-Chair.			
	Pete Edwards expressed an interest in being Vice-Chair.			
	Hollie asked the board to propose Martin as the Chair.			
	Amy Fox proposed, and Stewart Nubley seconded.			
	Hollie asked the board to propose Pete as Vice-Chair.			
	Cllr Relf proposed, and Dianne Holmes seconded.			
4	Engagement Update – Sarah Daniel			
	 Sarah explained she would go through the presentation received by Iceni on the residents' survey conducted (attached). 			
	 There were 344 responses to the public survey, and there was also a 			
	consultation at Outwood Academy with students.			
	Stage 1 Survey: Key Takeaways:			
	Parks and green spaces are valued but people would like to see			
	improvements.			
	 A strong desire to see a wider variety of shops, including local independent shops. 			
	 Regenerating the high street seen as key. 			
	 A more visible police presence would make people feel safer. 			
	 Resurfacing the roads (potholes) was felt important. 			
	What do you love about Kirkby question top three responses were parks /			
	green spaces, the leisure centre and the sense of community.			

- How proud do you feel to live/work/learn/visit Kirkby question with 0 being not at all and 10 very proud 51.5% scored Kirkby 5 or below, 48.5% 6 or above.
- For high street, heritage and regeneration the key themes included:
- Town centre feels run down and neglected.
- Suggestions of a better variety and quality of shops including independent shops.
- Kirkby has a strong sense of community and is a nice place to live and work.
- Poor quality roads.
- There's little for young people to do.
- Traffic and congestion.
- Sarah continued with what would benefit Kirkby's Town Centre the most with the responses including regenerating the high street, improved environment and funding to support the establishment and ongoing running of a specialist market.
- What do you think would benefit Kirkby's community assets and activity the
 most responses were new or improvements to existing community and
 neighbourhood buildings, programmes, exhibitions, events for community
 spaces, funding for local new and existing volunteering and social action
 groups, music and theatre performances, support for cultural and heritage
 network to share knowledge and investment and support for digital
 infrastructure.
- What do you think would benefit Kirkby's parks and outdoor sports the mostresponses were improvements to parks and green spaces, improvements to outdoor sport facilities, support for community sports leagues and tree planting.
- Residents were asked if they had any other ideas for Kirkby high street, its
 heritage or regeneration, with the responses being to improve maintenance to
 town centre, encourage local businesses and independent shops to open,
 improve parks and green spaces, stop anti-social behaviour, lower rents to
 encourage independent shops and a new outdoor market.
- How safe do you feel in Kirkby, with 0 being not at all and 10 very safe, half scoring 5 or below and half scoring 6 or above.
- For safety and security the key themes included:
- Feeling intimidated by large groups of young people.
- Electric scooters and mopeds speeding through town centre.
- Not enough visible policing on the streets.
- Anti-social behaviour.
- Street lighting needs improving.
- Feeling safe because of the friendly and close community.
- Ideas were listed in order of highest to lowest priority:
- Problem oriented policing, hotspot policing, improvements to streetlights, more CCTV, activity programmes and mentoring for young people, neighbourhood watch, help with increasing security of your home and alley gating.
- Other ideas on safety and security in Kirkby included better police presence, stop e-scooters, park wardens and better management of parks, breakup large groups of young people, better maintenance of estates and town, improve CCTV.

Sarah moved onto the transport and connectivity theme with what would benefit Kirkby's roads, footpaths and cycle paths the most with responses being highway maintenance, improvements to road network to relieve congestion, bus infrastructure to speed up journeys, new or upgrading of footpaths and cycle paths, improved road safety and electric vehicle charging facilities. Other ideas were resurfacing of the roads, investing in public transport, traffic light system review and tackling congestion. An overall question to ask what would benefit Kirkby the most had results of: Better overall maintenance Encourage local businesses and independent shops to open. New community facilities such as public markets. Improve road surfaces and traffic management. Activities for young people. Improve safety. Better police presence. Sarah went through the young people's consultation work. Teresa Jackson asked how the survey results compare with projects which are currently being developed and how can these be linked with priorities which are already happening, and if funding will be added to these existing projects to expand them. She also commented that the issue with the potholes should fall under Nottinghamshire County Council (NCC) however it has obviously been highlighted as a priority by residents. Sarah explained there is a longlist of projects to review later in the meeting where this will be discussed and that there are discussions with NCC to have more investment into the roads. Cllr Relf agreed on bolstering already established projects with extra funding to enhance them. He also recommended not using the Kirkby funding to go towards the roads as this funding can go elsewhere and we should be able to secure funding from NCC as expected. Andrea asked engagement partners if there were any other projects ideas that they had had discussions around that have not been captured on the survey. Partners confirmed the survey results reflected conversations they had. Mark Cawar commented that surveys can sometimes be leading in their answers and if there were any other ideas which we feel should have been included which weren't. Hollie explained there were sections within the survey to put ideas into a preference order but also there was space per theme where we asked for any other ideas from residents. Teresa added that she had visited Annesley Woodhouse and Village and the Parish Hall is closed a lot of the time, despite the building being relatively new. She also visited All Saints Parish Church and the hall, which is a good space however dated, and is also underused. Compare these to places such as Acacia Centre which is always full and need more space.

Teresa wondered how we can link the churches into this work.

She added that the timeframe to gain responses for the survey was quite short and it would have been beneficial to have longer to interact with residents. Amy Fox wanted to gain some more insight into the people who completed the survey. • She added she felt mental health had not been represented much throughout the survey, as people suffering with their mental health need additional support. • Gill Callingham wanted to confirm if the villages Teresa mentioned were part of Gedling or Ashfield. Hollie confirmed Annesley Village is part of Ashfield district. Cllr Relf followed on from Teresa to explain he felt it was the people within the community halls and centres who were able to get these thriving rather than the building itself, and he is keen to invest in the people organising these activities for the community. • He reiterated this is similar for shop also, we have ample shop spaces however need business owners to utilise these. Sarah confirmed that community assets were included within the longlist and thanked Teresa for visiting the residents in Annesley. Sarah ran through the demographics of the survey: 63% of respondents were female. 22.5% of respondents were aged between 51-60, 20% between 41-50, 19% between 31-40 15% between 61-70, 12% 70+, 7.5% between 22-30 and 1.9% 18-21 65% of respondents identified as 'Non-Disabled', 19% identified with having Physical disability/ Long Term Health Condition, 11% identified as having Mental Health and 5% as both above • 60% of respondents were Employed, 21% Retired, 11% Unemployed, 10% said 'Other' and 4% were Students. 74% of respondents are Kirkby residents, 9% work in Kirkby, 8% wrote 'Other', 4% are part of a community group, 3% are business owners and 1.5% are education providers. Local Challenges and Benefits - Mark Bandalli 5 Mark went through the updated challenges and benefits presentation (attached). • He explained the requirement is to develop a 10-year strategy and vision that identifies local challenges and the intended benefits of the Long-term Plan For Towns (LTPFT). The progress to date includes place diagnostic with data, review of various consultations, engagement with Council officers, discussion at May Town Board and outputs from public engagement. Beginning with the safety and security theme, Mark went through the local challenges and opportunities, the impact and the intended benefits from

these.

Martin commented that the underperformance in social trust compared to the national average was mirrored by other Chairs of Towns Board he spoke to when he attended the Chair's meeting and they also did not feel this was reflected within the community. Mark agreed and expressed that from the residents' survey there is more data to be seen. Martin asked board member for comments, and if the intended benefits output looked correct. Teresa Jackson expressed that an intended benefit is a reduction in levels of reported crime however Ashfield is below the national average for this, however there is also unreported crime happening and how can this be tackled. Mark agreed that crime rates in Kirkby are lower than average, however there is still a perception of crime which has come from surveys and data and there is a strong feeling there is too much crime. Mark accepts Teresa's point on unreported crime however finds challenges in monitoring this. Mark Cawar put forward using the measure of increase in pride in place as a way of seeing reduction of reported crime as well. Mark agreed this would be a way of recording, as well as an increase in residents reporting they feel safe in the town centre and their neighbourhood. Amy Fox put forward altering the terminology on the benefits as there are numerous focusing on young people and this could be changed to incorporate everyone. • Cllr Relf agreed with Amy, as he wants people to be satisfied with the town centre and not just young people. He commented on the point of reduction of reported crime, he understands that perceptions of Kirkby can be negative, however Ashfield is a very good place to live and residents can sometimes be negative so the perception is a key focus. Mark asked Cllr Relf if increasing residents reporting they feel safe in the town centre and neighbourhood should replace the reduction in levels of reported crime within the intended benefits or if they both should have a place on there. Cllr Relf understands the challenge of reducing crime and the only way of validating this is the reporting of crime, he does not want to lose the aspiration of reducing crime. Mark put forward putting residents feeling safe in the town and neighbourhood as more of a priority. Martin commented that in previous years an auditor came to Ashfield and they came with a preconceived idea of the area and were very pleasantly surprised when they arrived, which again relates back to the perception. Stewart Nubley noted that Ashfield Spartans Boxing Academy had recently won four gold medals and this was publicised in the Chad however nobody seems to know about this. He wondered how there could be an increase in the number of young people accessing youth provision when it is difficult to get the message out of provisions in the area. Sarah agreed that communication is an ongoing issue.

Hollie explained there had been work done with young people to consult on how they know about events or offers in the area and offered to share this with Stewart. Martin agreed that different groups need to use different outlets for marketing to hit their intended audiences and felt there is some work to do on this to identify these communication links. Pete Edwards raised that in the recent meetings he has been to where crime, and deprivation have been discussed. Pete has been an Ashfield resident for over 20 years and gets frustrated hearing the word 'deprivation' as there have been positive changes and there have been steps to improve the area. He believes it is the board's role to promote our assets and to understand how we can communicate provisions. This is a ten-vear project where the young people will be in their 20s, so working with children and young people are a priority but all residents need to be included. Teresa added that there is a polarisation of target groups and there is a need for an integrated society of mixed generations working together. There could be a reporting of good citizens doing great work and celebrating them. Christine Sarris agreed with comments made and would like a more focussed approach on the intended benefits such as asking groups of people where and when they do not feel safe in town centres and tackling these. By getting more people in the town centre it in effect makes it self-policing. Cllr Relf commented on the communication issues, and related that the council publicise in newspapers, on social media, use booklets posted to all Ashfield residents and they still are unaware of projects or events happening. He feels there is a piece of work more widely to get audiences to engage in communications. Alan Cooke expressed that having local people visit businesses and high street shops came across better than council officers. Martin expressed this is council wide and again is perception of officers. which the board can help change whilst working together. The board discussed communication barriers from their organisations and the perception of council workers. Mark moved onto theme two High streets, heritage and regeneration running through local challenges, impact and intended benefits. Amy Fox agreed with the intended benefits but wanted to highlight the root cause of these as around 21% of respondents to the survey are unemployed and if we tackle their mental health this can be a key challenge to helping their employability, spending in towns etc and felt mental health support was being missed in areas. Hollie expressed that giving people opportunities, events, and support all support people's mental health in them having a happy and healthier life. Dianne Holmes agreed that giving residents events in town centres has a knock-on effect for consumer spend and dwell time which benefits the town. She has found that having community hubs in Sutton town centre has brought more footfall into the town and spend. Roy Lewis added that there are no specific intended benefits for heritage and felt there could be more towards the enhancement of heritage assets. Hollie explained the longlist of projects does include some more specific heritage focuses.

Sarah asked Mark to include a reference to heritage within the intended benefits. Mark moved onto theme three, transport and connectivity and the local challenges, impact and intended benefits. Martin noted that potholes are an issue however if we spend the full funding over the ten years on these improvements there will be no longevity to the funding and benefits we could use it for. Mark added that the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) are keen for councils to identify areas that cannot be addressed within the long-term funding but can be addressed in other ways. Cllr Relf agreed with the points made and he is aware of the issues of traffic congestion getting through the town centre. • He is keen to use some of the funding to have a review of the traffic flow and use this as an avenue for further funding to address this. Roy Lewis commented that the intended benefits on the presentation look quite broad and it would be beneficial to have a more specific measure. One of the benefits of Kirkby is the relationship with the train station and the town centre and there is a potential to improve the linkage to improve the use of public transport to reduce the number of cars coming through Kirkby. This could include linking the bus routes with the train station, and links on the green route to Portland Park and Kirkby Woodhouse. He felt a potential benefit would be to make use of the position of the train station in the town centre. Teresa Jackson raised that the traffic coming into Kirkby meets at the Nags Head which affects the flow of traffic. She noted there are many right hand turns within the town centre which causes flow issues. If there is a review of Kirkby traffic, the road running from Annesley Woodhouse through to the bottom of Kirkby hill is a diversion for many people and this could be improved. Cllr Relf understood Teresa's points but is keen not to bypass Kirkby too much as businesses gain shoppers from this visibility. The Board then had a 10-minute break. **Project Prioritisation Criteria – Gill Callingham** 6 • Gill presented on the Long-Term plan for towns and project prioritisation framework for this (attached). Sarah added that we will not be focusing on costing at this point as there is also the potential of match funding so we do not want to reject some project ideas due to funding. She noted that the initial consultation was short and there will be a phase two consultation with the shortlisted projects put forward to the public to prioritise these in order of importance to them. From this there will be a clearer picture of what residents and businesses in Kirkby want. Teresa added that the revenue funding we can give straight away, if these can continue as groups in the voluntary sector get funding which is short term and projects aren't able to continue. Sarah confirmed this is one of the main concepts for this funding as it is a tenyear plan and creates sustainability.

- Pete Edwards noted that he is keen for the projects in Kirkby to all be accessible to everyone.
- As an example, Pete must go into Nottingham if he wants to access the train due to accessibility issues in Kirkby.

7 Discussion of Potential Longlist of Projects – Gill Callingham

- Gill presented the longlist of project to the board (attached).
- It was noted that this longlist to shortlist was not to confirm projects which would be agreed, but which projects will be taken to the second consultation.
- Some projects may be highlighted in this exercise however do not fall under this funding.
- The board discussed the list:
- Safety and Security
- Issues of street lighting around the town centre and some streets.
- Neighbourhood watch.
- Littering and dog fouling better than it used to be.
- Youth worker support and outreach project.
- The board agreed inviting the Council's Community Safety Manager to the next board meeting to understand the safety and security projects further.
- High Streets, Heritage and Regeneration
- Community Hub encompassing partners and support, including activities and events.
- Shop front grants, this is currently underfunded by UKSPF which is ending this year. Including enhanced support for businesses to apply for these grants.
- Developing the plaza, including shelter, and utilising the space more with events, markets etc.
- Street furniture and planters along high street and pedestrianised area in the town, add vibrancy.
- Further investment in our parks refurbishment, LED floodlighting, play zones, 3G sports pitches, BMX tracks.
